Then you should consider running for the **2017 NDA Board of Directors!**

We'd love to have you! Every year, we elect at least three new members to the board, each serving a term of three years. You could be part of the governing body of NDA, helping to grow and improve our organization and do as much as we can to serve our member family.

What do I have to do?

You'll be committing to attend regular NDA Board of Directors meetings in which the board discusses and votes on regular NDA business, rule changes, finances, events, and general management. These meetings are typically once a month and last about 2 hours, and you must attend more than half the meetings in a year. There may be other business conducted by the Board of Directors in between meetings via email.

Do I have to hold an officer position?

Nope. At the annual meeting, the NDA members will hold a general election to select our new members for the Board of Directors. Once the new Board of Directors is in place, the officer elections (President, VP, Treasurer, Secretary) will take place. The other four members of the board will be Board Members At Large.

What about Juniors?

We elect one Junior Representative to the board every year. The Junior Rep is just like any other member of the board; they have voting privileges and are required to attend board meetings.

It's okay—we're friendly! You don't have to have any previous experience working on a Board of Directors—though if you have, that's great, too! Whether this is your first time, or you've run for (or served) the NDA Board in the past, you are completely and totally welcome. We're looking for people who have great ideas and a desire to promote dressage in our community.

Okay, I want to throw my hat in the ring! How do I do it?

Hooray! To nominate yourself, all you have to do is send us a short bio describing yourself, your history in the dressage community, and what you might bring to NDA. Before the annual meeting, we will email all the candidates' bios to the NDA membership to review. At the annual meeting, you'll be asked to introduce yourself, and then the election will be held. If you are elected, your term will begin on January 1, and your first NDA meeting will be during that month. And remember—you must be an NDA member in good standing to be on the board, so make sure you renew your membership for 2017! You can do so at the annual meeting or online after September 30, 2016.

We can't wait to see you on the board!

Lynn Palm Clinic

Earlier in August, NDA hosted the Lynn Palm for Western and Classical Dressage Clinic at Heartland Equine Therapeutic Riding Academy in Gretna, NE. Eight riders attended, and the clinic was well audited. Lynn Palm's program consisted of two lectures a day that involved theory, reading a test and performing a test. Riders rode in groups and individually both days to introduce Western Dressage principles, and by the end of the clinic, each participant had performed a Western Dressage test!

There were many helpful insights from the clinic. Riding participant, Brenda Messick shared on her page, "Preparing For The Ride" on Facebook, "Cues are seat, legs and hands, in that order! Therefore, ride with leg cues before hands to work on the horse moving back to front." Brenda kept a detailed journal of notes and has posted her tips and takeaways from the clinic on her Facebook page.

Long time NDA member and traditional dressage and western pleasure, Diane Fucinaro shared, "The Lynn Palm clinic was very eye opening for someone transitioning to western dressage. It was great to get instruction and validation on my horse's gaits, help with my equipment and Lynn's evaluation of a ridden test." Diane went on to say, "I think western dressage is a wonderful

venue for horses who may traditionally not be considered 'dressage horses.' It's so great to be able to use principles of classical riding on my lovely western horses because in the end, whether you're trotting or jogging, cantering or loping, you still expect the same level of engagement and correct way of going for the individual you are riding."

All in all, most riders hadn't done a Western Dressage test



before. First time Western Dressage rider, Kendra Ronnau said, "I can't think of a more talented clinician to get me started correctly in the Western Dressage world. It was a wonderful weekend of learning from one of the best, as well as bonding with other participants." Kendra continued, "My hope is that NDA continues to bring top notch instructors to the area, thank you!"

Each rider finished the clinic riding down centerline and saluting at X with a big smile on their face! Thanks to all involved in planning and participating in this event, especially 3B Farrier Supply Store for their sponsorship and HETRA, for allowing us use of their beautiful facility. ••

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Why Equestrian Should Be Kept in the Olympic Program

Why should Equestrian be kept in the Olympic program?

With journalists begging the question, a little history lesson might help answer the question. The sport of Equestrian dates back not only to 1912 and the first modern Games; it was actually one of the sports within the Ancient Olympics in Greece over 2000 years ago in the time of Socrates.

At that time, Zenophon, a student of Socrates and a soldier in the cavalry, created the first school of Dressage in order to train the horses for warfare. One can imagine how effective horses trained to move both forward and sideways at the

same time, to rear and kick back or to strike out with a forefoot at the opposing ground soldiers, could change the game. And so it was that Equestrian became one of the great sports throughout history.

There was no doubt that the three Olympic sports of Dressage, 3-Day Eventing, and Show Jumping, would be in the Olympic family from 1912 in Paris. America was always successful and I had the privilege of representing our country in 6 Games from 1984 through 2004, where our Teams continued to produce medals again and again.

We are the one sport where women and men compete together and where another living being, the amazing horse, adds to the complexity and the beauty of our sports. Making one's own body go faster, drive harder, and reach further for the Gold is one thing;

having the trust of over 1000 pounds of power in an animal famous for both its strength and speed as well as being an "animal of flight", is quite another. Riders spend years forming incredible bonds with our horses just



as most of you reading this have made with your dogs or cats.

Running, jumping, and truly every movement performed in Dressage, can be seen being performed by horses free and playing in their pasture. Training them to do these same things on command and in total harmony with their human counterpart is the foundation of our art and sport. This is why 65,000 people come daily to Aachen, one of our biggest European, multi-discipline competitions, to watch and be fascinated as our horses jump higher, run faster, and dance majestically to music.

To ever take this historic sport out of the Games would be to lose not only one of the first, but one of the most noble and thrilling sports in the Olympic Family. ••

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
