Making Strides in Savannah:

2019 GMO Delegate Convention Report

It was my pleasure to represent NDA as our GMO Delegate at the 2019 USDF Convention in Savannah, Georgia, in December. My responsibilities as a Delegate include voting on any Board of Governors (BOG) business on behalf of NDA, representing our members' voice in our organization's national governance.

I was lucky to be joined by two additional NDA members: Jane Fucinaro and Kathy Hanford as Region 4 PM Delegates. It was another year of a strong Nebraska presence at Convention!

It was, as always, a delight to catch up with other Region 4 representatives in our Regional meetings. Anne Sushko continues her wonderful leadership as our Region 4 Director, and she brought several great topics to discuss as a region.

As a region, we discussed the unfortunate fact that two major showgrounds have closed their doors in 2020, Rio Equestrian and Mason City Fairgrounds, and several long-time shows in Region 4 that will no longer be held. This makes it more crucial than ever that we work together to support the rest of the shows in the region, by being conscientious about communication and judge selection.

We also discussed a proposed fundraising idea to offer

an optional (voluntary) fee on all GMO-sponsored showbills in the Region that would give participants the opportunity to donate to the Region. This idea is still being explored. Additionally, we talked about the importance and success of USDF Instructor Certification training, the L Program, the Regional Schooling Show Awards program, and the two important upcoming events being hosted in Omaha: 2020 USDF Convention and 2023 World Cup.

The region also brought forth two motions to address some suggestions that have been made by members of the region this year: 1) The group moved to include a regional team score at the Festival of Champions. 2) The group moved to escalate the idea of dividing Freestyle classes at Regionals into AA & Open divisions, instead of lumping them all together.

Outside of our (very busy!) regional meetings, I also attended several committee meetings and open forums that spanned all aspects of USDF. The Rule Change Forum is always interesting, as new and proposed rule changes are discussed. Much of this year's changes included massive rewrites of important rules like DR 121 (Saddlery and Equipment) that didn't actually change much, but clarified a lot of outdated or confusing verbiage. The Competitions Open Forum talked a lot about the difference between being disqualified and eliminated, and shed some very interesting light on which aspects of the competitions are at the judge's discretion versus the TD's discretion.

By the end of 2020, some big responsibilities are shifting away from USEF's jurisdiction: all tests will be written by USDF, rather than USEF. And all training of licensed dressage officials (judges, TDs) will also move from USEF to USDF.

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During the GMO roundtable discussions, we covered topics like the new USDF Regional Schooling Show Awards, which is an awards program for any schooling show that applies and is sanctioned by USDF. We also discussed the varying educational programs that GMOs across the country have found success with, and we came back with some great ideas!

As for the BOG, there were three big topics of discussion.

First, there were a couple of ideas proposed regarding rider divisions: splitting “Junior/YR” into separate “Children” and “Youth” divisions; and splitting “Adult Amateur” into separate “Senior” and “Everyone Else” divisions. Both of these proposals are aimed at fairness—to keep 8-year-olds from having to compete against 18-year-olds in the same class, and to keep 65-year-olds from having to compete against 25-year-olds. The BOG voted to move the splitting of the Junior/YR division ahead to a committee for final implementation, and voted that the division of the AA division at least warrants further discussion by the executive board.

Second, a proposal was brought to create a new type of “non-competing” USDF membership option for lapsed Participating Members who did not renew because they were not showing. This membership type would allow people access to educational materials and magazine subscriptions, and remain involved in USDF. However, the BOG determined that creating a non-competing “membership” would cause headaches when these “members” try to compete at shows. The motion as brought was defeated, and the board will continue to work on this effort as a “subscription” rather than a “membership,” for clarity.

Third, the BOG voted on the election of several new board positions. One of these positions, Vice President, was a hotly contested campaign between Kevin Reinig of the California Dressage Society, and Ken Levy of the Indiana Dressage Society. Both candidates spoke to the group, and ultimately Kevin Reinig won the election and will serve as USDF Vice President in 2020.

Lastly, I was honored once again to accept NDA’s website award for Best User Experience for a GMO with 75-174 Members from USDF President Lisa Goretta. This is NDA’s fifth straight year being honored in this category, and we couldn’t be more proud!

With 2019 Convention in the rearview mirror, NDA is looking excitedly ahead to 2020 Convention—in Omaha!! We’re already hard at work with Region 4 planning for an incredible welcome party at the Omaha Zoo and a fantastic conference that welcomes our nation’s top dressage professionals to the Heartland. Save the dates for December 2-5, 2020, as we will surely need lots of local volunteers to help make this event spectacular.

Cornhusker Classic: Now Accepting Entries!

With fewer show weekends on the USDF Region 4 competition calendar this year and only one show on Memorial Day weekend (May 22-24), please submit your Cornhusker Classic entries as soon as possible! The prizelist and entry form will be available on the Nebraska Dressage Association website under Shows & Events at <https://www.nebraskadressage.org/cornhusker-classic.html>. Friday's schooling show will be WDAA Recognized and has applied for USEF Lite status.

Nebraska Dressage Association (NDA) has hired Joyce Hardesty for our Friday schooling show with Melissa Creswick for Western Dressage on Friday. Melissa will stay to judge our Classic I and II shows and DSHB (breed) show and will be joined for Saturday and Sunday's Level 3 shows by Gail Hoff-Carmona. NDA is excited to host these well-respected judges with multiple certifications, both from California this year!

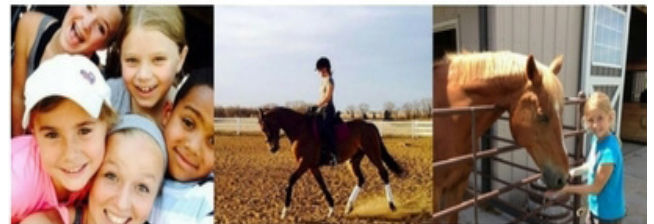
While the Cornhusker Classic is expected to have more entries in 2020, very little else is expected to change for our 43rd annual show. With two schooling show judges on Friday, we are considering scheduling morning rides in two rings to allow for more warm-up time Friday afternoon. For Saturday and Sunday, the primary show rings will be Amy

Countryman in Pavilion 4 (east-most arena), which all double judged classes will be scheduled in, and the Multi-Purpose Arena (connected to the stalling barn). Warm-up arenas will be in Pavilion 2 (the stalling barn) and Pavilion 3 to the south. Our show office will remain in the ABATE Room next to the main show arena in Pavilion 4.

Looking ahead, the 2021 Cornhusker Classic will not include a schooling or Western Dressage show on Friday, primarily to avoid conflicting with the robust schooling show schedule that private organizations and facilities host each year. However, Nebraska Dressage Association plans to offer a traditional classical dressage schooling show plus WDAA and USEF Lite Western Dressage show in conjunction with their September 2021 Schooling Show Championship. Another change for 2021 will be that the Classic will not offer a breed show due to the declining number of judges available with both DSHB and S/Dressage credentials (only 12 in 2020 meet this requirement). We welcome feedback on these two important decisions by e-mailing the competitions committee through jcrawlson@windstream.net.

Please mark your calendars in Sharpie for Memorial Day weekend and plan to join us for the only rated dressage show in Nebraska! immunologist who devoted much of her life to the research and development of several medical diagnostic products such as the "Mono Test," a quick diagnostic test for infectious mononucleosis, and immunologic pregnancy tests for people as well as horses. Gail, as owner and director of Los Alamos Dressage Center, received two Proclamation citations from the New Jersey State Assembly and Governor Whitman for civic work done to benefit both the community and equine research at the University of PA School of Veterinary Medicine. I'm told you can't teach an old dog new tricks. Thank god I'm an old horse, because boy howdy have I learned a lot about dressage. Hi all, my name is Coco Moonpie. I'm a 20 year old grade mare. I used to live over in Iowa in pasture with another horse I really hated and so my old owner made a trade and now my new owner, Zack, tells me I'm gonna be a school horse.

"A School horse?" I wondered when I moved into Lincoln Equestrian Center this past fall. "What in the world is that?" I dug my readers out of my bag and logged into the Horse Internet and found out that a "School Horse" is a much beloved equid that humans new to horsemanship and riding (you know the basics, stop, go, left right) work with while they are learning. An important part of this human training in my mind is the part where they learn to hold their hands flat to safely give a horse a treat.

Anyhow...since I've moved out of the pasture and into the realm of an equine academic professional I thought to myself "Hey...I'd better figure out what I'm teaching!" While I was reading the NDA Handbook online, I learned everything there is to know about the Schooling Show Medal Series and Championship (Except if I can wear my readers in the arena...how big are those letters? They look awful small on the YouTube to me!) In order for any of my students to qualify for the Championship show and in order for any of our sure to be amazing scores to count towards year end awards, well by-golly I have to be Registered with NDA.

So I was downright happy when Margo got home from the NDA Banquet in November and told me I was paid up. Whew. What a relief, even if my kiddos don't make it to the show ring until 2021 at LEAST I am fabulous and at least I'm a registered horse, and we never have to worry about doing that again, because it's a one time \$40.00 fee. Now once my students seem ready they'll have to join NDA too, except humans have to renew EVERY YEAR AND remember to renew BEFORE THEY SHOW or their scores won't count. Can you imagine?

I'm so excited you guys. The kids and grown ups have a lot to learn about posting diagonals and what colored pants to wear. Meanwhile I'm gonna keep reading through all these rules I'll let you know if I figure out anything else.

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school, Kyle Ballard, who had worked with horses in the area and invited Zack to apprentice under him as a Journeyman Farrier.

A NEW HOME

Now Zack Hamilton is the owner of Lincoln Forge and Farrier, a full-care farrier service. As an AFA Certified Journeyman Farrier operating out of Lincoln Equestrian Center, where he and his wife, Margo Hamilton, make an incredible team. When the facility came available for purchase in 2014, this was the perfect opportunity to build his dream business in residence at Lincoln Equestrian Center.

His mission is focused on keeping horses healthy from the ground up, so they are performing as well as they are physically able for their purpose and tasks. He promotes a wellness-based schedule of regular appointments for each horse depending on the individual needs of his clients' horses. In his experience working with the hoof, he has observed that some horses can make it a full 6 weeks before needing to come back, while others absolutely must be seen every 4 weeks to maintain soundness.

He enjoys the challenge of working with athletic therapeutic cases, working with the veterinarian and trainer to correct performance issues. Watching how the horses move on the ground and under saddle is key to his process. So if Zack is your farrier, don't be surprised to see him next to the show ring watching your horse's hooves hit the footing.

He spends extra attention on geriatric cases, to find innovative ways to keep aging horses comfortable and moving well through the advancing years. After spending his youth breaking and training young horses for the trails, he continues to enjoy to work with young horses helping them to develop confidence while shoeing or trimming.

LIFELONG PURSUIT OF EDUCATION

As with most careers in the equine field, Zack's education has been on-going. He makes a point to regularly attend farrier and vet clinics for continuing education, seeking out opportunities to expand his knowledge of biomechanics of horse movement, forging techniques and therapeutic work.

AN ACADEMIC BEGINNING

From a families' perspective, it's always a responsible move to hold down a job while you attend college. But Zack Hamilton's grandfather had an exceptionally creative idea: shoe horses as a side job in college, which would allow Zack to graduate from his future equine science program with business experience and a full resume. It was a win-win scenario for Texas-born Zack.

So, immediately after high school, Zack found himself heading to Missouri to attend Heartland Horseshoeing School, where he learned from generations of horseshoers within the Gregory family in an 26 week farrier program. Zack's positive experience at horseshoeing school caused him to fall in love with it as a career, rather than pursue it part-time like originally planned. His journey to the Lincoln area began with one of his instructors in



In particular, Zack has enjoyed going to Iowa State to learn from Doug Russo, CJF, AWCF, the in-clinic farrier at the vet hospital.

“Doug has a good mix of traditional techniques and modern science. He’s seen so much working at the vet hospital, he has a lot of expertise.”

Zack can also be found often competing at state and regional farrier contests where contestants are judged on their ability to build shoes, which keeps him in great practice for those tough therapeutic cases. In the beginning, the lack of any pre-made shoeing options meant everything was customized, and even now, pre-made shoes are custom-fitted to a certain degree.

PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS

As a businessman, Zack’s focus is on maintaining a high level of client communication and maintaining a functional hoof capsule for the horse, along with meeting the animal’s individual needs, whether that’s a barefoot horse or a heavily-working shod horse. Passionate about animal care, having raised and cared for animals all of his life, he always keeps his eyes on what is best, and most suitable for each creature he cares for.

Outside the forge, Zack is also the president of the Midwestern Farriers Association, and was also the highest-scoring farrier in the nation on his practical exam for his Journeyman certification in 2019.

Zack has a special appreciation for the support he has experienced by the equine community of Lincoln. He can often be seen in residence at the Cornhusker Classic and the Shaggy Schooling show, and services the majority of the Eastern NE area. Zack often consults with other top farriers and local vets when he encounters an exceptionally challenging job, and views his farrier work as part of your “support team,” helping partnerships achieve their goals in the show ring. While his business is conducted from Lincoln Equestrian Center, Zack also travels to make farm calls.

No matter what your personal goals may be with your horse, it is no question that Zack has the professional expertise to ensure that your horse has the solid foundation needed to succeed in training and the show ring.

A reminder from the Western Dressage committee—Western Dressage riders need to renew their NDA, WDAA and USEF memberships to be eligible for the NDA year- end “recognized show” awards. If you have only an NDA membership then you will qualify for only the Schooling Show series of awards. Please remember to register your horse with NDA as well. Only scores from WDAA recognized shows will count towards “recognized show awards” so be sure to show at our recognized shows during this show season. Thus far we have 3 recognized shows scheduled – the Central Nebraska Classic on April 25-26, the Cornhusker Classic Schooling Show on May 22, and the Summer Solstice Schooling Show at S&L Stables on June 27. Hopefully more will follow as the show season progresses.

We have 2 upcoming Western Dressage clinics: April 4th, Jenna Brumm from Kansas will be at S & L Stables, Bennet, NE., see our NDA calendar for more info on this one and tentatively June 12-13 a clinic featuring Frances Carbonnel from Colorado at the University of Nebraska Animal Science Complex. The clinics are open to all riders – English and Western. Both clinicians have extensive experience with all types of riders and breeds of horses.
