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My name is Chloe Brinson, I ride an Appaloosa gelding named Sundown Dream, and I began riding dressage about three years ago. Ever since I began doing dressage I, just like countless

others, decided that I wanted to make it to the "big leagues". Everyone needs to start somewhere, so I decided to start with the 2014 Region 4 Championships. I knew with scores in the upper 60's from the year before that I would be able to qualify, the only problem standing in my way were finances.

I decided to apply for the 2014 NDA Jr/YR scholarship to help pay our way to Mason City, Iowa. I wrote my essay and learned that I had indeed been chosen to receive the \$500 scholarship to aid in my journey to Regionals. We put most of the money towards the entry fees and the remaining went towards the gas needed to drive there.

Regionals was unlike any show I'd ever been to, so many big, fancy horses in one spot! The night before my championship class we settled Pugsley into his stall and let him relax after a long drive to Mason City. The morning of the Training level championship class Pugsley and I took a walk around the grounds and I got my real first look at all the high level horses. I've never seen so many high quality, well bred, well trained horses in one place.



Warming up before the championship class was quite an adventure, even after a long lunge session, Pugsley was high strung and excited. We entered the warm up ring, only to have Grand Prix horses doing flying changes right next to us, sending Pugsley into a panic. I could just hear my little 15.1 hand Appaloosa "ooh" and "ahh" over the giant 16-plus hand Warmbloods! I was just as distracted by the beauty of the horses and riders as Pugsley was! As I began to focus on our upcoming task, I realized that convincing Pugsley to behave and focus wasn't going to be easy! His trot was accompanied by bucks, his canter was more like a series of small rears, and he wouldn't relax to do any sort of stretching.

I took a deep breath and walked into the arena, waited for the judge to ring the bell, and hoped for the best. It wasn't our best ride, nor was it our worst. We finished 12th in a class of roughly 20 other horse and rider combinations, not as good as I hoped, but better than I expected! Regionals was an eye-opening experience, I realized that climbing to the top isn't going to be easy and I also realized that the piaffe scares Pugsley. I can't wait to qualify and go to regionals in 2015 and learn even more about dressage!



Adult Amateur

First, I would like to thank the NDA board for awarding me a scholarship this year. When the opportunity to apply was announced, little did I expect to win. What a nice surprise because as we all know, this is not an inexpensive sport. My goals require instruction and training on a regular basis and I have committed to budgeting for those expenses. Any help is much appreciated. I applaud NDA for establishing this program and would encourage others to apply. I am also anxious to hear how others have used their scholarship funds.

In applying, I stated I would use the funds toward riding with Kathy Connelly at a clinic in May, 2014. Unfortunately, I applied late and was only able to get one lesson with her. The good news is I had money left over to apply to lessons with Debbie McDonald. What a year to have the opportunity to ride with these two top clinicians!

Providence Farm was the site of both clinics. Since it was the more recent, I will talk more about the Debbie McDonald clinic. We all know her as a past member of various US teams, having ridden her big red mare, Brentina, to WEG, the Olympics and many other major international competitions. She is somewhat retired from riding now and focuses primarily on High Performance athletes for USEF. As NDA's own Jami Kment has been identified as a High Performance prospect, we are fortunate that a clinician of Debbie's caliber will consider coming to the heartland to teach.

There was a wide range of experience in the riders and horses from around Region IV. Included were Casey Blum of Lincoln who rode her own Eschaton at training/first level up to Amy Stuhr Patterson from Kansas City riding her Wieske at Intermediare to Grand Prix. Jami Kment also rode Zania and continued her work on the Grand Prix movements. I always appreciate the opportunity to watch and interact with dressage enthusiasts from other parts of Region IV.. We have so much in common in our goals to be the best riders and horsemen that we can be. Much can be learned from auditing and I made a point of being back in my seat observing when I wasn't riding. No matter the training level of the horse and rider the basics of thoroughness, suppleness and engagement were repeatedly emphasized.

I found Debbie McDonald to be an excellent teacher who with her unparalleled eye also has a great sense of humor! She emphasized and helped me grow in my understanding of the frequency the half halt is needed and what a subtle aid it should be. In trotting the long side for example, approximately every 3rd step she asked me to squeeze my shoulder blades together. The effect was to engage my core which in turn asked Monty to engage his body to a greater degree. The result was improved self-carriage. She pushed me to get out of my comfort zone and really let him show his expression by using the half halt instead of just holding him back. The result was a big expressive trot which felt like flying! It gave new meaning to the idea of "riding up to the bridle"!

We also worked on straightness, a concept which challenges riders of every level. I continue to try to learn the differences between bend, flexion, shoulder-fore and straightness and the place each holds in effective riding of any kind. My two sessions at this clinic were very helpful to me in this regard.

We at NDA have many opportunities to see top clinicians in our area. There are several who regularly teach in the Kansas City area. The USDF Adult Clinic will be held at Providence Farm in May, 2015 and will feature Kathy Connelly and Betsy Steiner. Debbie McDonald has promised to return in the fall of 2015. Don't miss the chance to ride or audit whenever you can. I always come away inspired to keep improving in this challenging sport we have all fallen in love with. Thanks again to the NDA board for awarding me this scholarship.

The daily routine for a visiting student is a daily lesson with either Sarah or Clayton, time to watch other rides and lessons, and generally enjoy being immersed in a high quality training program. Sarah and Clayton have a very holistic approach to management focusing

horse management, focusing not only on training, but also the mental and physical well-being of their equine athletes. Horses are given as much pasture time as possible, suport with natural horsemanship techniques as necessary, and cross training including hacking on trail rides to keep the horses fresh and engaged in their work.

Ten days goes by in a big hurry, but it's worth it to have the chance to really delve into some training concepts that would be difficult to address at a three-day clinic. This year, we focused on using a combination of natural horsemanship techniques and classical exercises to try and create more consistent, quiet responses to the aids. And of course, to help my horse, I have to improve as well! My continual goals are

better balance and strength through the core.

I really enjoyed the opportunity to meet other students who also made the trip out to train. This year, there were students from Oklahoma, Arkansas, Kansas, and Colorado, as well as fellow NDA members Melissa Ward, Heidi Helmer, and Michelle Rohman. It was so fun to watch the other riders on their educational journeys and to learn from their lessons along with mine.

I had a fantastic trip to Boston and was honored to represent NDA and carry our votes at the USDF Convention from December 3-6. It was great to network with other GMO representatives and hear what works for their groups and what keeps their organizations running. I was very inspired to come back and do more, smaller, educational events for NDA to really increase the amount of participating members we have.

As NDA's representative, I carried four votes for our membership (proportional to the size of our GMO). It was my job to attend as many meetings as I could, as delegated by our Region 4 Reprentatives. All of us from Region 4 met in the morning and divided up how many meetings we could individually attend. At the end, we all came together and discussed each meeting we sat in on. I attended meetings for Region 4, Adult Programs, Youth Education and Youth Programs, Historical Committee. GMO Committee and Competitions Forum.

Region 4 will be hosting a CDI* in OMAHA! This CDI* will be in conjunction with the International Omaha Horse Show on April 9-11 at the Century Link Center. The space is very limited, so if you are considering competing, send in entries ASAP!

USDF encouraged each of us to at-

tend the USDF/USEF Rule Change Open Forum, so that we could have an understanding of the new rule changes or modifications. Several big changes that you might want to look into are the changes to saddle pad logos during competition and Opportunity Classes in liscensed shows. On the USDF Homepage, you can find a link for all the latest changes.

The Round Table discussions were incredibly useful. This gives GMO Representatives an opportunity to discuss issues they have in their organization, successes that they found, methods of increasing volunteerism, and so on. I am proud to say that I believe NDA is right on track with some of the bigger GMOs! We might be smaller, but I do feel like we have a great membership.

We were encouraged to remind our membership that USDF is here to serve us! E-trak is an excellent tool for educational events, and the new "On the Levels" is a fantastic toolit's a dressage video library that includes examples of all the new tests with commentary from top US trainers and judges. It is only \$20/ year for unlimited access. Available as an app, or online!

USDF is also asking us to submit nominations for Year End Awards to USDF. There are so many awards available to GMOs to recognize the work of volunteers, it would be great for NDA to get some recognition for it's excellent talent! USDF is working on creating an online form to make this process easier.

On top of the meetings, the whole Convention was jam-packed with educational sessions, including a great lecture by Dr. Hilary Clayton called "Going in Circles: The Biomechanics of Working Your Horse in Circles," which will be featured in the USDF Connection magazine. Other big features included lectures by Kathy Connelly and Betsy Steiner (look for them in May at Providence Farm!), Kristi Wysocki and Bill Solyntjes, and many great sessions on nutrition, health and saddle fit.



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
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
